


President's Note

Finally Summer! As we enjoy the warm, (sometimes hot) weather, plentiful rain, and the beauty of our world, may we thank God for these blessings along with the chance meetings of those we encounter each and everyday.

One of the United Methodist Women Mission u Book studies this year is entitled *Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools* by Monique W. Morris. This study will raise awareness of this crisis in the lives of Black girls, thereby providing an opportunity for missional engagement and social justice advocacy by Christian women, congregants, and the community of faith. This tool will assist in navigating an in-depth personal study and as an introductory resource to understanding how mass incarceration affects Black women and girls in the United States.

I recently received a request from a local unit as to how to obtain a copy of the film documentary *Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools* for them to view in their local unit.

I asked the National UMW, and this is their reply:

I'd direct you to the website for the Pushout film (pushoutfilm.com) for information on local showings that might be available in your area or to the distributor website.

We purchased a digital file distribution copy for the national office, which allowed us permissions to download the film and then screen it on Zoom for educational use (no fee charged to participate). We are not able to share that file with others given licensing permissions, but we would encourage you to purchase a copy for yourself if you might be interested in a screening. One note if you do go that route: when I spoke with the distributors, we qualified for the less-expensive option, and so I think it's safe to assume that you would, as well. It's actually listed "K-12 Classrooms, Public Libraries" but they said we could purchase at this price point, as well. Hope this is helpful!

The book I would like to Spotlight this month is entitled *Beyond Loneliness: The Gift of God's Friendship*. It is written by Trevor Hudson, and can be found in the category of Spiritual Growth in the UMW Reading Program Catalog 2021-2022. Loneliness touches everyone, and it can be one of the most painful experiences of life. People long for relationship with others, but what may surprise them is that God longs to be friends with them. This book provides guidance for building a close friendship with God and easing the ache of loneliness. This book has two interwoven themes: Friendship with God and Personal Transformation. It is a guidebook for stepping into the eternal living described and modeled by Jesus. A personal note on this book: Each chapter includes 'Friendship Exercises' which offers time to reflect the content being given, either on your own or with others in a small group setting. I am thinking of using this in a small group book study.

The Reading Program is a cherished UMW tradition that brings together members in mission as they explore, share and discuss the books. From captivating novels and heartfelt biographies to urgent messages about issues such as climate change and mass incarceration, there's something for everyone. Practicing generous living requires faith. In fact, it might just even be a testimony to how strong our faith really is. Are we able to believe enough to make sacrifices because we believe in the goodness of God and His abundant blessings, knowing that



when we give to others, we are not really losing anything? Our generous God doesn't want to have us give out of guilt or fear. He's inviting us to put our complete faith in him, to totally trust Him and his provision for us, as well as our ability to "abound in every good work."

Thank you to the units who have sent in your pledges and continue to send in donations. As we take off the masks maybe we will be able to get to a place of fundraising and generous giving again.

Lora Crombez shared some ideas at our last leadership team meeting to try to think about and organize ideas about fundraising. She sent out an email of ideas for fundraising and the following information:

According to AARP: In the United States, the average charitable giver is 64 years old, with Baby Boomers accounting for 41% of charitable giving. AND in 2019, more than \$449.64 billion was donated to nonprofit organizations.

I picked a few of her suggestions just to get you thinking about some new ways to be able to re-begin some fundraising. (*editor's note*: Lora collected three pages worth of ideas. I've not included them *all* in the newsletter. They are available on the district UMW website as part of the Spiritual Growth leaflet.)

- **It's raining money: Hang an umbrella upside down in the narthex and ask people to contribute their extra pocket change each Sunday for a month.
- **Summer Grandma Read-a-thon: sponsors could donate a specific amount based on how many pages they read with their grandchildren.
 - **Hold a Bakeless Bake Sale
- **Host a "guess how many" jar guesses are bought for a small donation. The winner receives a prize for the closest guess that does not exceed the number of items in the jar.

Dates for 5 Star Donation Recognition

There has been some confusion in regards to when units send the final yearly pledge donations for remittance and how that applies to the 5 Star Recognitions. The "Fiscal Year" for processing unit/district giving, ends in November (NOT December). Any amounts given in December are held for processing until January of the following calendar year. This, I have found, affects whether a unit or a person qualifies for Five Star recognition. If the unit/person has given to 4 categories from January to November and then sends a check in December for the 5th category that donation is held and posted for the following year, and is not applied to the 5 star categories for that year. I hope this makes sense. If this is really confusing for anyone, please give me a call.

As always please let me know if you have any questions or concerns in regards to donations or pledge amounts.
