Fund and I wanted to answer that question more thoroughly here – after researching on the UMW website.

At Mission u, many of us had the opportunity to study Climate Justice and learned that climate change does not affect everyone equally. The poorest people around the globe suffer the most from the increasing greenhouse gases in the atmosphere and 70% of the world's poor are women and children. Women around the world work at a grass-roots level to improve life for their families and communities, as they assume responsibility for their family's basic needs of water and food. Our giving to the UMW Women's Carbon Fund supports:

- 1. Women led projects that lower CO2 emissions that contribute to climate change;
- 2. Women led projects that help women, families and communities whose lives have been affected by climate change adapt to new conditions; and
- 3. Climate and energy advocacy initiatives led by women for women – enabling solutions that bring about greater equity, along with sustainability.

Who will we become and what will we do in the coming year?

From Our Social Action Coordinator



These verses, Joel 1:1-2:22, I Timothy 3:1-15, might sound familiar because our UMW Prayer calendar asked us to read them October 20-23. God's word jump out at us as our **guide for**

social action. Everything we do, other than our private personal prayers, is our social action. Even our private personal prayers may be classified as social action if we are interceding on behalf of others prayers. Because we are still alive, God is gifting us with involvement in social actions.

The above Joel passage tells of a locust invasion. Verse 12 ends with "The people's joy has withered away. Mourn, despair, wail, grieve are calls to the people to lament their social circumstances. God declares <u>what they</u> <u>are to do</u> in Joel 2:12-14. Verse 13 states, "Rend heart and not your garments. Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love..."

The Joel passage indicates that God took pity on his people. He told them he was sending enough to satisfy them fully. The same compassion and pity came to us when God, in Jesus, came to be our enough! Our enough includes indwelling God, the Holy Spirit.

In the 2 Timothy portion of the reading,

Paul was letting young Timothy know what kind of people would be in his social circle, even his church social circle. Paul warned Timothy in verse 5, to *"have nothing to do with such people* (people denying God's power.)" Paul alerts Timothy, <u>and us</u>, verse 12, "in fact, everyone who wants to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted.

Then Paul goes on to teach Timothy, in verses 13-17, something we as United Methodist Women know. All Scripture is Godbreathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, So that all God's people (all UMW women) <u>may be thoroughly</u> equipped for every good work.

We are equipped to live in Christ in victorious vitality. Our joy has not withered on the vine as in the Joel passage; we have Jesus-Joy and vitality in spite of social circumstances. Through our hearts, souls, minds, hands feet, God is working everything out for all good. We can "lay hold on the raw materials of human living-justice and injustice, pleasure and pain, compliment and criticism- and take them up into the purposes of our lives and them transmute into character and usefulness"(Abundant Living p285, E Stanley Jones).

Equipped with victorious vitality, we become the servant of the sorrows of <u>others</u> in their social needs.

Julia Chance, managing editor of *Response Magazine*, posted an article on 10-12-2016 about the UMW Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors. The article indicates that
